Understanding the letter

1. Who wrote this letter? Who did they send it to?

The letter was written by tea farmers and workers in Kenya. They sent it to tea drinkers, shops, and leaders in the UK.

2. How does growing tea help the farmers and their families?

Growing tea provides income for the farmers, which they use to buy food, send their children to school, and keep their villages healthy and clean.

3. What problems are the tea farmers having? Name two.

The farmers are receiving less money for their tea while the cost of living is going up, and they are facing challenges from changing weather, such as too much or too little rain and plant diseases.

4. Why is it important that farmers earn enough money?

7. How can people who drink tea in the UK help the farmers?

They can choose to buy Fairtrade tea, learn about where their tea comes from, and ask shops to offer fairly traded products.

8. What do the farmers want shops and leaders to do?

The farmers want shops and leaders to support Fairtrade, offer fairly traded tea, and make decisions that help farmers receive fair prices and live better lives.

9. How are tea drinkers and tea growers connected?

Tea drinkers rely on the growers for their tea, and the growers depend on tea drinkers to buy their products. Choices made by consumers can directly impact the lives of the farmers.
